Thank you, and goodbye

As we head into the season of Thanksgiving, I am reflecting on my retirement this month after 30 years of Service and the many things I am thankful for. This will be my last article as Senior Enlisted Advisor (SEA), and I am passing the baton to Chief Master Sgt. Al Velez, who is an enthusiastic leader and mentor with a dedicated focus on the off-duty education, career, and transition needs of Service members. The SEA position will be in great hands and I know he will be a passionate advocate for you.

In keeping with the theme of Thanksgiving, I am borrowing from David Letterman and his infamous Top-10 list segments. I have created my own Top-10 list of DANTES programs that I am thankful for as a Service member. So here it goes...

Number 10: Educational Reference Resources

Resources include: (1) college and career web information; (2) student financial aid; (3) MGIB, 9/11 GI bill and Veterans information; (4) graduate programs; (5) college accreditation information; and (6) online occupational outlook handbooks.

Number 9: CENTCOM/AFRICOM Education Opportunities

Face-to-face college instruction, National Test Centers and education support services are available

to Service members deployed to the CENTCOM and AFRICOM areas of responsibility. Continuing education does not have to stop just because a Service member is deployed.

Number 8: Troops to Teachers

A program funded by the Department of Defense, managed by DANTES, that assists military personnel to begin new careers as teachers in public and charter schools and may provide stipends and bonuses up to \$10K. www.proudtoserveagain.com

Number 7: Servicemembers Opportunity Colleges (SOC)

SOC is a network of higher education associations and institutions that expand and improve voluntary education opportunities for Service members by offering: (1) reasonable transfer of credits between SOC institutions; (2) reduced academic residency; (3) credit for military training and experience; and (4) credit for nationally-recognized testing programs.

Number 6: Distance Learning (DL)

This program: (1) evaluates institutions for inclusion in DANTES DL catalogs; (2) researches unique DL opportunities for Service members; and (3) creates DL brochures for distribution. The program also developed and implemented the DANTES Learning Readiness Self-Assessment (DLRSA) to help Service members determine their readiness to take DL courses.

Number 5: OASC and CPST

The Online Academic Skills Course (OASC) and College Placement Skills Training (CPST) are designed for individuals who want/need to build their reading comprehension, vocabulary and math skills to pass their exams, excel in their jobs, advance their careers, or

continue their education. There is unlimited and FREE access around the clock for Service members (Active Duty, Guard, Reserve, and Coast Guard) and their families. The courses are self-paced and customized to the individual's reading level, vocabulary, and math ability based upon a pre-test. Lessons are supported by interactive exercises such as drag-and-drop matching, video-game-style multiple choice or dynamic flash cards. Quizzes and practice problem sets help students gauge how well they are mastering the material. CPST and OASC also provide helpful articles covering such topics as "How to Beat Test Stress" and "Last-Minute Study Tips" and detailed tips and strategies for doing well on college entry and testing exams. Active duty Service members can access these programs via their Service portals (AKO, NKO, AF-Portal, and Coast Guard). Because both courses are self-paced and on-line, you can access it 24/7 anywhere that you have an Internet connection and the desire to get started! www.nelnetsolutions.com/dantes/

Number 4: Counselor Support Programs and Kuder® Journey

Through Counselor Support, commercial assessment tools are available free-of-charge to help Service members prepare for their future. Tools include: (1) career assessment inventories; (2) career exploration; (3) tentative career direction and educational plans; (4) identity of SOC schools; (5) development of job seeking skills; and (6) creating résumés. The Kuder Journey career guidance system is a valuable resource paid for by DANTEs for active duty military personnel and Service members in transition. It provides tailored career guidance to Service members by a simple 20 minute assessment, and aids with an occupation search which narrows down a list of occupation fields that are right for them. From those occupations a list is provided of the education needed to pursue that career, as well as information on financial aid and job search and placement tools. Service members don't even have to complete the assessments at this time; just activate the free, lifetime account. Activation takes less than 30 minutes. DANTEs encourages all Service members to take advantage of this FREE career guidance system. www.dantes.kuder.com

Number 3: Academic Testing Program

Tests are fully funded for Active Duty, Guard, Reserve, and Coast Guard. Academic exams like High school equivalency, College Level Examination Program (CLEP) and DSST, undergraduate/graduate admission exams and teacher

certifications are all covered by this program. Over 117,868 credits have been earned with a cost avoidance of \$25M in tuition assistance (TA) funds. Save yourself both time and money by taking DSST and CLEP tests to help reduce the number of classes you may need for your degree program. You can earn college credit for what you already know by earning qualifying scores on introductory-level college subject examinations. Just remember the first time you take a test, it is fully funded; if you fail the test you will have to pay for any re-tests of that subject.

Number 2: The Joint Service Transcript (JST)

This is another benefit and an important resource that I am thankful for. Check out your JST to see what American Council on Education (ACE) recommended college credits you may qualify for from your military training and experience. The JST is available online for personal use or may be officially sent to accredited colleges and universities. The JST is available at no charge to the Service member from the JST website <https://jst.doded.mil>. Note: the Air Force will continue to make its records available through the Community College of the Air Force (CCAF) and the Air Force Virtual Education Center; subsequently, Air Force records are not reflected on the JST.

...and Number 1: Military Evaluations Program

This program evaluates Service school courses and recommends college credit for military training and occupations. Credits (if accepted by an institution) are applied to a Service member's degree or vocational certificate. Last year, over 700,000 ACE recommended credits were awarded with a total cost avoidance of \$155M in tuition costs.

So, that's my Top-10 list of the many programs and services DANTEs offers to Service members that I am thankful for. What are you thankful for? As you celebrate Thanksgiving, whether at home or while serving in the Fleet, Field or Air, know that Americans can give thanks that their freedom and way of life are defended by the strongest, most skilled, and educated military force in the world. I salute each of you for your patriotism, your sacrifice, and your dedication. Have a wonderful Thanksgiving and know that we have a great deal to be thankful for. Changes are underway in the Examinations Program

Reimbursements and Vouchers

Following the June conversion of the Praxis exam to computer-based testing, DANTES migrated to a reimbursement process for this exam. DANTES has also transitioned to reimbursements for the GRE Subject exams. These changes became effective Oct. 1, 2014, coinciding with the release of a new, consolidated reimbursement form (see [September DIB](#)). The revised Reimbursement Request Form is for all authorized programs (GRE General and Subject/GMAT/Praxis); separate forms must be submitted for each individual program. Service members and Test Control Officers (TCOs) can download the Reimbursement Request Form at www.dantes.doded.mil/content/exams_reimbursement_form.pdf. Once completed and signed, mail it to DANTES, along with a legible copy of the official score report and the test fee payment receipt. A TCO's signature is no longer required.

GED

DANTES no longer requires military examinees to pass an official practice test prior to sitting for the GED exam. In January, GED published GED Ready™, a computer-based practice test aligned to potential outcomes and readiness for the 2014 GED Test. Examinees may access this practice test, on a self-funded basis, via the www.myGED.com portal's student-created account. All DANTES candidates (including overseas military family members and logistically-supported civilians and their family members) must complete the DANTES Registration via MyGED. TCOs should continue to provide DANTES-sponsored vouchers to eligible military members, along with instructions for using the voucher(s) to cover exam fees. The DANTES Examinations Program Handbook (DEPH), along with the [GEDTS DANTES](#) Web page, contains detailed information for TCOs to guide students.

USAFI/GED Transcripts

United States Armed Forces Institute (USAFI) transcripts are now available at no charge to the Veteran on the Joint Services Transcript website <https://jst.doded.mil/usafi>. Along with the transcript, individuals will receive the passing standards information for the First Series GED exam. Upon request, the GED Testing Services will provide diplomas for candidates

demonstrating passing scores on their USAFI-era transcripts.

DANTES Exams Program Handbook (DEPH)

The DEPH has been updated with revisions that include condensed, uniform information for all exams that are now reimbursable or administered as Internet-based. The DEPH will be published every six months vice quarterly. The first biannual DEPH is now available on the TCO Portal.

CLEP retesting

Beginning Oct. 17, 2014, all examinees taking CLEP exams must wait three months before retesting on a self-paid basis. Examinees who tested prior to Oct. 17, 2014, must wait 180 calendar days to retest, as previously required. TCOs should refer to the DEPH for more information.

ACT

Before placing an order for new materials, TCOs should have returned all obsolete 2013-2014 (69C) test booklets and destroyed all unused 2013-2014 answer folders prior to Oct. 31, 2014.

Use the 2014-2015 test booklets and corresponding materials beginning Nov. 1, 2014. These materials are valid until Oct. 31, 2015.

ACT exams are:

- » not automatically distributed each year
- » not distributed until all previous year's materials are received and cleared at ACT
- » reusable only at stocking test sites
- » ordered using the 2014-2015 ACT DANTES Order Form (Exhibit 1 in the DEPH)

Note: To increase the security and safety of the ACT test, effective Sept. 1, 2014, ACT policy prohibits providing detailed information regarding the version of the ACT assigned to DANTES Test Sites.

The current year version of test booklets and order forms will no longer reflect a combined 3-digit number/letter code.

- » ACT will assign test booklets a different color-coded symbol for each new testing year
- » order forms will continue to reflect current testing year without identifying the test booklet form

Register for CLEP exams and advance your education

The DANTES-funded College Level Examination Program® (CLEP) offers Service members the opportunity to get college credit by earning qualifying scores on any of 33 introductory-level subjects. CLEP is proud of its long-standing relationship with DANTES, providing exams that allow Service members to save money and time towards a degree, advancing their education or career.

The CLEP program has created a video demonstration that guides DANTES-funded test-takers through the CLEP exam registration process. The video shows Service members how to create a profile through the My Account registration portal, order exams and study materials, identify an institution's CLEP policy, send scores to an institution, and schedule an appointment with the test center.

Back to the future...new DANTES ref pubs ordering process

Every year, DANTES Program Managers must determine which and how many resource materials they purchase to offer to education professionals in the field. Over-purchasing can create wasteful surplus and under-purchasing can lead to quantity restrictions. Looking for a better way, DANTES has changed the ordering process: education centers will order a year's worth of materials and publications at one time, during an 'open season' ordering period. From now until December 31, DANTES will solicit pre-orders from all official DoD education activities.

Some education officers, technicians, and specialists may remember when DANTES used a similar process in years past. As in those years, DoD education offices and field activities will be prompted to select and order materials and publications in one, annual order. Along with instructions for ordering, a catalog of available materials will be provided.



It is very important for education activities to invest in this process and assist by projecting their needs. Pre-orders will drive DANTES purchasing for FY15. The DANTES budget is finite. Therefore, we rely on education professionals in the field, who best know their center's needs, to identify which resources and the correct quantities needed. To help DANTES assure each activity defines their needs, either an order or a negative reply will be sought.

Watch for the message — coming soon — that will prompt official education offices or field activities to order DANTES materials and publications for FY15. Again, responding is vital to ensure enough of the right materials are purchased. Our goal is to identify needs BEFORE the DANTES procurement process to eliminate waste and devote resources to in-demand items, as determined by the field.

Minnesota Guardsman transitions from military Service to teaching as a second career using TTT resources

Retired Col. Brad Jensen always thought that, after retiring from the military, he would enjoy teaching high school in his hometown area of East Central Minnesota. After traveling the world and serving his country for 26 years in the active Air Force and the Air National Guard, he brings his vast knowledge back to the community that helped shape the qualities that led to his successful military career.

With the help and encouragement from Troops to Teachers (TTT), Jensen has now realized his dream: he is currently the teacher and coordinator for the Hinckley Finlayson Alternative Learning Program (ALP).

“I always thought I could use my military intelligence and leadership background as a high school social studies teacher,” says Jensen, “but life has a way of tweaking our plans.” Working with the one year old ALP has been both challenging and rewarding. “I have said a number of times that my goal would be to help prepare high school students to be productive citizens in this country,” he remarked, “And what better place than in the alternative learning classroom?”

“Troops to Teachers was one of the services I took advantage of to help with my transition into the classroom,” says the retired colonel. “Although I did not use the financial benefits available during my schooling to attain my teaching license, I found the mentoring and job search tools Troops to Teachers offers to be very useful in getting interviews and landing a teaching job.”

Jensen brought all of his knowledge, experience and skill gained during his military Service and lessons learned from TTT to the classroom, guiding and mentoring his students. His hard work and dedication truly paid off when he was recognized as the Hinckley-Finlayson 2013-2014 Teacher of the Year.

Minnesota is part of the Lewis and Clark TTT region that also includes Idaho, Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Wisconsin, and Wyoming. TTT is a Department of Defense program that helps military men and women transition into careers as public school teachers by providing counseling and assistance regarding teacher certification requirements, employment leads, and more. TTT is more than a program designed to assist military personnel transition to teaching as a second career, it is a program that brings talent into the public schools that helps our children learn and grow.

Scholarship change may help spouses of fallen Service members

The Veterans Access, Choice, and Accountability Act of 2014 (“Choice Act”) was recently signed into law. Most of the Act pertains to Veterans health care, but it also included changes to GI Bill® benefits.

One change pertains to the Fry Scholarship, created to honor Marine Gunnery Sgt. John David Fry, 28, of Lorena, Texas. Fry had one week left in his tour in Iraq in 2006 when he volunteered to continue working for seven more hours disarming explosive devices, despite having already sustained an injury to his hand. He made the ultimate sacrifice March 8, 2006, when an improvised explosive device detonated. He left behind a widow and three children. Veterans Affairs (VA) has created Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) Agreements with both the Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors (TAPS) and the Children of Fallen Patriots Foundation with the sole purpose to encourage cooperation and collaboration between VA and both of these important organizations, to promote the Fry Scholarships to eligible individuals.

Section 701 of the Choice Act expands the Fry Scholarship to include surviving spouses of Service members who died in the line of duty after Sept. 10, 2001. Prior to this law, only children of those who died in the line of duty were eligible for this benefit. The VA

has had the honor to have served 1,279 children under the Fry Scholarship in FY 2013 and looks forward to now honoring the surviving spouses.

The law states eligible spouses are entitled to receive 36 months of full benefits, including tuition and fee payment, a monthly housing allowance, and a stipend for books and supplies. Training must start on or after Jan. 1, 2015, and the spouse has 15 years from the date of the Service member’s death to utilize benefits. If a spouse remarries, benefits end on that date.

Some spouses currently eligible for, or already receiving, benefits under the Survivors’ and Dependents’ Educational Assistance (DEA) program may now be eligible for the Fry Scholarship. DEA is an educational program offering up to 45 months of education benefits to eligible dependents of Veterans who died while on active duty, as well as dependents of Veterans who died as a result of a service-connected condition or are permanently and totally disabled due to a service-related condition. Surviving spouses of Service members who died in the line of duty after Sept. 10, 2001, will have to make a one-time irrevocable election to receive either the Fry Scholarship or DEA.
